

Siletz Tribe Regains Section of Cape Foulweather on Oregon Coast

CTSI Reacquire 27 Acres at Cape Foulweather

On November 18th, the 47th anniversary of the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians (CTSI) regaining federal recognition, it was announced that a coastal piece of their ancestral territory had been restored.

The 27-acre section of Cape Foulweather, on the Oregon Coast between Newport and Lincoln City, has been reacquired by the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians, or CTSI. The tribe purchased the land from the McKenzie River



Trust, with a \$2.01 million grant from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. Other partners include Lincoln County, the Nature Conservancy in Oregon, and the Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development.

Tribal Council Member Robert Kentta said, "Before settlement, this land was home to our families, who fished from the rocks and canoed in the ocean, and gathered mussels from the rocky shore. Now we will have the opportunity to reinvigorate our connections to traditional lifeways."

Spotlight on Invasives, Holiday Edition: English Holly

Tis the season to deck the halls with boughs of holly! This flowering plant, with its shiny, spiky green leaves and bright red winter berries has long been a festive symbol of good luck, protection, and the promise of spring's return. But holly is not so jolly when it's found in our Oregon forests.

English Holly is native to Europe and Northern Africa, and just like its fellow shadeloving English Ivy, it thrives in the dense forests of western Washington and Oregon, outcompeting native species, and significantly changing forest composition and reducing biological diversity.

Cottage Grove Community Garden for Latino and Immigrant Families









Project Overview

Plaza de Nuestra Comunidad (formerly Centro Latino Americano, Downtown Languages, and Huerto de la Familia) is developing a brand-new community garden in partnership with South Lane School District in order to increase local food security and support community connection. This new garden will be located behind Cottage Grove High School.

40 families will receive their own 15 x 20 ft. garden plot, seeds and other gardening materials, and access to communal tools. One-on-one gardening support will be provided by Garden Program staff along with information about other community resources. This community garden will primarily serve Latinx and immigrant families, however all South Lane School District families and community members are welcome. All programming will be offered in Spanish, English, and some Mam.

In addition to the garden space and supplies, Plaza provides gardening support, connection to community resources, educational opportunities, and community building events. This includes an introductory course on organic gardening, and a variety of food and garden workshops that are led by garden program members.

The community garden's design prioritizes community building, accessibility, and environmental stewardship. It will include seating areas, a shade structure, raised beds, rainwater harvesting, composting, native plant patches, pollinator habitat, and more.

Plaza currently manages six other community gardens throughout Lane County with around 200 families growing their own organic produce.



Project Phases

Phase 1: Fall 2021 - Spring 2024

Partnership development, site selection, garden design.

Phase 2: Fall - Winter 2024

Preparation and construction of the garden.
Outreach and recruitment to community members.

Phase 3: Spring 2025

Opening of the garden.

Families receive their garden plots and plant their crops.

Phase 4: Fall 2025

Harvest Festival Grand Opening Celebration



About the role:

The Institute for Applied Ecology (www.appliedeco.org) is at the forefront of rare species conservation and solving the biodiversity crisis in the Pacific Northwest.

The Conservation Research (CR) Program of the Institute for Applied Ecology (www.appliedeco.org) is seeking to hire a Full-time Research Technician with a diverse skill set to assist with multiple research and monitoring projects to support the conservation and recovery of rare plants and wildlife. The Technician will be based in Corvallis, Oregon. The Technician will spend substantial time in the field during the primary field season (approximately mid-April through July) coordinating and leading field crews. The rest of the year will be spent supporting occasional field work, managing data and field equipment, assisting with analyses and report writing, and preparing for the next field season. Projects are primarily in western Oregon, but additional projects routinely take place throughout other regions of the state and throughout the Pacific Northwest.
